



Inconsistency with General Plan – Environmental Justice

Guiding Principle 5 of Chapter 3 is to "Provide healthy, livable and equitable communities."

The General Plan addresses environmental justice by raising awareness of a number of issues that impact the County's unincorporated areas, including but not limited to excessive noise, traffic, water pollution, air pollution, and heavy industrial uses.

Inconsistency with General Plan – Environmental Justice

The CalEnviroScreen overall score is inclusive of the pollution score.

- The overall score is calculated by multiplying the pollution burden score by the population characteristics score.
- The percentiles range from 0% to 100% and represent the least pollutionburdened to most pollution-burdened census tracts in the state.
- The higher the percentile, the greater the pollution burden for the census tract



- On September 6, 2024, the Board approved the AB 617 Public School Air Filtration Program
- Public schools and school districts located within AB 617 Communities and their vendors are eligible to apply for:
 - High Efficiency Particulate Air (HEPA) filtration systems, and
 - Replacement filters



- Up to \$13.7 million in Community Air Protection incentive funds is available for the installation and/or maintenance of HEPA filtration systems
- Staff has conducted outreach to eligible school districts and vendors
- Applications are due by 3 pm on December 20, 2024
- Staff anticipates to begin awarding contracts in Spring of 2025





- South Coast AQMD collaborates with LA County Fire Department (LACoFD) on a regular basis
- During Q1 2024, LACoFD identified and provided a list of their known auto body shops

Develop outreach material and provide to fire departments

• During Q1 2024, LACoFD provided South Coast AQMD with guidance documents on paint booth filters, used oil generator requirements and accumulation storage time limits for hazardous waste for distribution

Auto Body Shops

Auto Body Shop Enforcement (ELABHWC-5f-01) Detailed Status Update

Fire departments to conduct inspections, distribute outreach materials and compile compliance statistics

- South Coast AQMD inspected 52 auto body shop facilities in the ELABHWC community during the reporting period
- Five (5) Notices of Violation and fifteen (15) Notices to Comply were issued to auto body shops
- Six (6) locations were found to be occupied by businesses not requiring South Coast AQMD permits
- Four (4) locations were found to be abandoned or out of business
- South Coast AQMD inspectors distributed the LACoFD guidance documents during the 2024 inspections





- Expected completion by early 2026





Clean Truck Check Overview

Who is regulated?

CARB

Diesel and alternative fuel heavy-duty vehicles over 14,000 lbs. operating in California, including out-of-state vehicles

Is enforcement ensuring equity?

- Roadside Emissions Monitoring Devices (REMD)
- CARB enforcing out-of-state vehicle compliance
- CHP enforcement; non-compliant vehicles may be denied entry into ports and railyards
- Estimated emissions benefits from Notice to Submit Testing letters for CY 2023 and CY 2024 are:
 - 2.1 tpd NOx reductions in 2023
 - 4.6 tpd NOx reductions in 2024

U.S. EPA Waivers & Authorizations

 After CARB adopts a regulation for an emissions standard for new motor vehicles, CARB requests a waiver or authorization from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) under the U.S. Clean Air Act.


- CARB generally does not enforce a regulation with a pending waiver or authorization request until the EPA approves the request or determines a waiver or authorization is not necessary.




OVERVIEW & LOCATION OF MOBILE MONITORING SURVEYS

Measurements were conducted in ELABHWC and SELA communities

> <u>52</u> survey days (June 2022 through September 2023)

~ 240 hours of measurements within the two communities





GENERAL OBSERVATIONS



Relatively elevated levels of metals were observed near some clusters of metal processing facilities



Consistent elevated levels of metals were observed on freeways, major roadways, and on- and off-ramps



Elevated levels of mineral dust tracers highlight the impact of resuspended dust




Metal Enhancement

Based on mobile monitoring results, some facilities were prioritized, and inspections were performed by Office of Compliance and Enforcement (OCE)

Based on mobile monitoring results, areas were also prioritized for followup stationary measurements






